Photography has given me a greater understanding of the self by allowing me opportunities to explore the world and document my reactions to it. Analysis of these reactions has given me a heightened awareness of my personal and social identities, while fostering greater respect for shared human experiences.

In 1999, I earned a BA in Studio Art from the College of Charleston. Upon entering my first photography class, I was a Biology major. My initial attempts at exploration through photography were based on an inquisitive interest in documenting animal behavior. While enrolled at the College of Charleston's Studio Art program, I developed a deeper appreciation for the role of art in the world.

After graduation, I worked as the R-3 Printer at Charleston's only professional photo lab. This position afforded me the opportunity to meet local professional photographers whom I later assisted on commercial shoots. In 2000, I was hired as the College of Charleston's first Photography Lab Technician. In this position, I realized my passion for teaching and the reward of helping others solve both aesthetic and technical problems. In 2001, as a member of a group of professional photographers, I helped develop and implement an after-school mentoring program for inner-city children. Working as a member and teacher contributed to my growth as an artist, and more importantly, as a member of my community. It also instilled an awareness of the psychological and social impacts that visual imagery could have on the viewer.

In the spring of 2005, I served as an Adjunct Professor of Photography at the



College of Charleston. That summer I collaborated with the Charleston County School District and created a three-week Photography program held at Redux Contemporary Arts Center that aided in raising the students' selfesteem and awareness of their creative potential. My understanding of my role as an artist and my responsibility to use photography as an education tool to strengthen society emerged from this experience. In the fall of 2007, I was an Adjunct Professor at Trident Technical College and taught a Large Format Photography class.

As a teacher of photography I aspire to prepare students to express their own ideas with a thorough grounding in skill and technique. The institutions in which I have been fortunate to teach represent a diverse range of students and educational goals. I have developed an approach to teaching the medium that addresses and balances each of these important areas: discovering and nurturing students' individual strengths, developing technique, building strong concepts and the ability to articulate them, and inspiring students to use these skills and knowledge to develop and express their own original ideas through photography.

"Frank"

The "Frank" mask's original persona was a manifestation of my fears, the boogieman incarnate. Since then it has taken on expressions of other emotions that all humans share. When the mask has no physical structure to give it form, it morphs into something uncomfortable and frightening, much like the world in which we often find ourselves when faced with fear or doubt. The mask, when worn by a model, takes on whatever emotion the model decides to portray through his or her body language. Sometimes it is acted; sometimes it is genuine. I search for these common human emotions in all



of my subjects and attempt to represent them accurately. Once the viewer gets over the shock of the disturbing mask, he or she can see that "Frank" feels the same emotional highs and lows that we all experience. My goal is for the viewer to recognize how similar we are, as beasts and as humans, so that we may bypass the prejudices we hold for the unknowns and appreciate each other on an immediately genuine level.
